COURSE DESCRIPTION

Students will engage in the sport of soccer in a format designed to create competitive play more so than recreational

1. COURSE GOAL

Upon completion of this course, students will understand the tactical aspects of soccer in a competitive match

2. COMPETENCIES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 Distinguish between major systems of play around the world and how to use them.
- 2.2 Diagnose attacking styles of play and create defensive systems most effective against those attacking systems of play.
 - 2.3 Explain the positional attacking and defending roles of all 11 positions on the field.
 - 2.4 Identify strengths and weaknesses of various defensive systems of play. Explain how to maintain strengths and improve weaknesses for one team and how to eliminate strengths and exploit weaknesses for the other team.
 - 2.5 Compare and contrast tactical systems in a head to head setting and prepare a predictive analysis. Explain the benefits of predictive analysis for attacking and defending.
