ECE 270 EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION INTERNSHIP

Credit Hours: 4 Experience 8

PREREQUISITES: ECE 165 and 166 and 200 and 205 and 206 and 208 and 210 and 211 and 240 and 243 and 245 and 250 and 260 and 265

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Capstone course that provides the student with directed participation in an appropriate early childhood setting.

1. COURSE GOAL

Allow the early childhood education student to demonstrate their knowledge while working in an early childhood setting

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 plan and supervise appropriate curriculum activities for children.
- arrange and care for an early childhood environment.
- 2.3 demonstrate being the "head teacher" in an early childhood classroom.
- 2.4 demonstrate meeting children's needs and supervising children and their activities.
- 2.5 demonstrate skills that foster an effective working relationship with staff and parents.

3. <u>METHODS OF INSTRUCTION</u>

- 3.1 Lecture/discussion
- 3.2 Media and video presentations
- 3.3 Guest lecturers
- 3.4 Role-playing activities
- 3.5 Participation with children in an appropriate early childhood setting for 180 clock hours

4. <u>LEARNING ACTIVITIES</u>

- 4.1 One hundred and eighty (180) clock hours minimum of directed experience in an appropriate early childhood setting
- 4.2 Planning of curriculum and individual lesson plans
- 4.3 Supplemental reading assignments in addition to the text
- 4.5 Compile a log

5. EVALUATION

Evaluation is intended to offer feedback and promote growth as a professional. It is a continuous process dependent on the student and his/her interaction with the learning materials and the learning environment.

6. <u>STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES</u>

- 6.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
- 6.2 If a student is unable to attend the course or must drop the course for any reason, it will be the responsibility of the student to withdraw from the course. Students who are not attending as of the

- 45th day of the course may be withdrawn by the instructor. If the student does not withdraw from the course and fails to complete the requirements of the course, the student will receive a failing grade.
