ECT 214 COMMERCIAL ELECTRICAL APPLICATIONS LEVEL 2

Credit Hours: 3 Lec 2 Lab 3

PREREQUISITE: None

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The selection, installation, operation and maintenance of generators, to include how to isolate and repair minor generator problems. Recognize the uses, operation of control devices. Introduction to structure cabling methods and types of cabling used.

1. COURSE GOALS

- 1.1 Identify and install commercial services.
- 1.2 Prepares learners to identify installation for motor controls.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 Identify service components in relation to overhead and underground services, switchgear and multi-family services.
- 2.2 Calculate synchronous speed and conductor ampacities.
- 2.3 Size fuses for short-circuit, overload and circuit protection for motors and motor starters.
- 2.4 Size equipment grounding conductors.
- 2.5 Install capacitors for power factor correction.
- 2.6 Install campus backbone, equipment/telecom, riser, horizontal and work area subsystems.
- 2.7 Terminate UTP, RG6 F-Type fiber optic cabling.
- 2.8 Ground and test voice data voice video (VDV) systems.
- 2.9 Identify electromechanical relays, magnetic contactors, control transformers, switches, sensors and pilot lights.
- 2.10 Select NEMA/IEC magnetic contactors and motor starters.
- 2.11 Select motor enclosures, interpret installation diagrams and connection of motor controllers.
