MUS 201 YUMA CHORALE Credit Hours: <u>1</u> Lec <u>1</u> Lab <u>2</u>

PREREQUISITE: MUS 200

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Advanced level of a large community chorus that performs major choral works and is open to all interested singers by audition. It is a multi-level class.

1. <u>COURSE GOALS</u>

- 1.1 The Yuma Chorale will perform choral music for large ensembles for two major concerts per semester
- 1.2 The choir may also sing for special concerts or social functions upon request

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 demonstrate mastery of music fundamentals in regard to choral art music in preparation for upperdivision study
- 2.2 perform and demonstrate the following in preparation for collegiate upper-level study: matching pitch, intonation, tone, blend, balance, enunciation, and pronunciation in English and several foreign languages.
- 2.3 demonstrate a sense of responsibility regarding ensemble performance suitable for upper-division study.

3. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

All instruction will follow standard rehearsal procedures

4. <u>LEARNING ACTIVITIES</u>

- 4.1 Rehearsal by full choir and by section
- 4.2 Sight reading of new music
- 4.3 Singing with good choral ensemble sound
- 4.4 Singing with good choral ensemble balance
- 4.5 Singing with good choral ensemble blend
- 4.6 Singing with clarity of pronunciation through vowel position and placement

5. EVALUATION

- 5.1 Grades will be earned by an assortment of learning activities, exams, assignments, and participation

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES
