ARIZONA WESTERN COLLEGE SYLLABUS

MUS 223 PIANO 2A Credit Hours: <u>1</u> Lec: <u>1</u>

PREREQUISITE: MUS 124 or MUS 126 and instructor permission required

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an applied music individual half-hour per week lesson designed to develop advanced college-level performing skills on the piano. There will be an added focus on developing proper technique by not only continuing the study of all major and minor scales and arpeggios, but by increasing the study of exercises, such as those by Hanon and Czerny. The student and instructor will meet each week to work on various aspects of piano playing and to build a repertoire of music. This course is required of music majors whose major instrument is the piano.

1. COURSE GOALS

- 1.1 Explore a wider range of repertoire, including technical exercises and all major and minor scales over the entire range of the piano.
- 1.2 Continue the development and improvement of the student's sight reading ability.
- 1.3 Practice and understand appropriate literature, such as the etudes by Hanon and Czerny.
- 1.4 Perform recitals and other public concerts from memory.
- 1.5 Continue the development of proper technique.

2. <u>OUTCOMES</u>

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 play short Czerny etudes.
- 2.2 play various technical exercises.
- 2.3 use correct fingerings when playing all major and minor scales and arpeggios.
- 2.4 sight read two staves with both hands playing at the same time.
- 2.5 recognize literature from the major historical periods.
- 2.6 perform pieces from memory in class and in formal and informal recitals.

3. <u>METHODS OF INSTRUCTION</u>

- 3.1 Private one-on-one tutoring on the piano
- 3.2 Musical demonstrations and suggestions for improvement given by the instructor
- 3.3 The selecting of literature from major composers and major historical periods
- 3.4 The selecting of technical material from Czerny, Clementi, Cramer, etc.

4. <u>LEARNING ACTIVITIES</u>

- 4.1 Weekly lesson preparation
- 4.2 Sight reading exercises
- 4.3 Assigned materials practiced and completed
- 4.4 Recital and performance preparation

5. <u>EVALUATION</u>

- 5.1 Grades will be earned by an assortment of learning activities, exams, assignments, and participation.

6. <u>STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES</u>
