ARIZONA WESTERN COLLEGE SYLLABUS

MUS 265E STRING INSTRUMENT - ELECTRIC BASS 2A Credit Hours: <u>2</u> LEC/LAB: <u>1.2</u>

PREREQUISITE: MUS 164E or MUS 166E - Instructor permission required

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is applied music, an individual one-hour per week lesson designed to develop college-level performing skills on the electric bass. This course is optional for music majors whose major instrument is the bass. This is the third semester of the class.

1. <u>COURSE GOALS</u>

- 1.1 Materials that fit the skill level of the student and address the needs for improvement will be selected.
- 1.2 Activities that improve note reading skills, correct posture, and correct hand position will be implemented.
- 1.3 An acceptable proficiency for end-of-the-semester performance will be attained.

2. <u>OUTCOMES</u>

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 demonstrate clear and precise articulation at the level of a college sophomore.
- 2.2 demonstrate control and refined tone production over the complete range of the instrument.
- 2.3 demonstrate technical proficiency at the level of a college sophomore.
- 2.4 demonstrate technical flexibility at the level of a college sophomore.
- 2.5 demonstrate accurate intonation at the level of a college sophomore.
- 2.6 demonstrate a refined concept of musical interpretation at the level of a college sophomore.
- 2.7 read and correctly interpret the various chord symbol notations.

3. <u>METHODS OF INSTRUCTION</u>

The course is a one-on-one private lesson.

4. <u>LEARNING ACTIVITIES</u>

- 4.1 An individual lesson will be provided each week of the semester.
- 4.2 Scales, etudes, solos, and method books will be used for instruction.
- 4.3 Sight-reading exercises and duets will augment other study materials.

5. <u>EVALUATION</u>

- 5.1 Grades will be earned by an assortment of learning activities, exams, assignments, and participation.
- 5.2 Please see the instructor's class schedule and assignment sheet for more information.

6. <u>STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES</u>
