MUS 70F CIVIC ORCHESTRA Credit Hours: <u>.5</u> Lab <u>.5</u>

PREREQUISITE: None

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Civic Orchestra's purpose is the performance of standard orchestral literature written for full orchestra, with the possibility of smaller ensembles performing chamber works at the instructor's discretion. The class is designed for community members, high school students, and other performers. A multi-level class. CR/NC OE/OE

1. COURSE GOAL

The Civic Orchestra performs music for full orchestra for major concerts. It performs upon request for the college and other public functions.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 play and perform orchestral literature.
- 2.2 execute the basic components of playing: tone quality, balance, blend, intonation, technique, rhythm, and ensemble awareness.
- 2.3 sight-read music, possess good pitch, and understand the basics of melody, harmony, tonal balance, rhythm, bowing, technique, and ensemble skills.
- 2.4 demonstrate an understanding of orchestral protocol in performance.

3. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

All instruction will follow standard rehearsal procedures.

4. <u>LEARNING ACTIVITIES</u>

- 4.1 Rehearsal of music by the full ensemble and by section
- 4.2 Sight reading
- 4.3 Perfection of intonation across the orchestral ensemble
- 4.4 Perfection of technical playing across the orchestral ensemble
- 4.5 Awareness of orchestral protocol during rehearsals and performances
- 4.6 It will be between the instructor and the student to determine how the class time will be fulfilled during the semester.

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6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 6.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
