PSY 227 PERSONALITY
Credit Hours: 3 Lec 3

PREREQUISITE: PSY 101

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course covers the definition of personality, its development, and theories about its functioning. It includes the history of personality theory, diagnosis, treatment and current conceptualizations of personality.

1. COURSE GOALS

- 1.1 Think critically about the concept of personality, personality formation, and their own personality development.
- 1.2 Discuss how psychological theories of personality coincide with their own personality experiences.
- 1.3 Identify how personality permeates every component of human existence.
- 1.4 Describe how personality can be conceptualized in different ways by different theorists.
- 1.5 Apply what they have learned about personality in order to predict the behaviors of others around them (especially in relationships and in the work site).

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 define personality and distinguish it from other psychological variables.
- 2.2 describe and give examples of several important theories of personality.
- 2.3 critique what they see, hear, and read about personality.
- 2.4 relate several personality theories to themselves and others.
- 2.5 write about, diagram, and interpret concepts of personality, their own personality, and theories of personalities in college level essays.
- 2.6 extrapolate from personality theory to their own lives.
- 2.7 describe current trends in personality diagnosis.

3. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

- 3.1 Lecture, class discussion, real life examples, reading assignments
- 3.2 Audiovisual materials as needed
- 3.3 Class participation

4. LEARNING ACTIVITIES

- 4.1 Lecture, group discussion
- 4.2 Homework, quizzes or exams
- 4.3 Written assignments or class presentation

5. EVALUATIONS

- 5.1 Grades will be earned by an assortment of learning activities, exams, assignments, and participation

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES
