RAD 205 ADVANCED RADIOLOGIC PROCEDURES

Credit Hours: 4 Lec 3 Lab 2

PREREQUISITE: RAD 106

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Positioning of the skull and facial bones, introduction to special procedures.

1. COURSE GOAL

Perform imaging studies of the skull and facial bones, long bone measurement and contrast studies of the spine and joints.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 Give the function of the anatomical structures
- 2.2 State the location of the structures in anatomical terms
- 2.3 Identify the anatomic structures on a diagram, model, bone or skeleton
- 2.4 Demonstrate the manipulation of equipment.
- 2.5 Position and align exams of the skull, sinuses, and facial bones.
- 2.6 Evaluate images for proper demonstration of anatomy and pathology.
- 2.7 Describe the radiographic procedures involved with and identify the radiographs produced by the following special radiographic procedures: hysterosalpingography, sialography, orthorentgenography, myelography, and arthrography.
- 2.8 Articulate the patient preparation for each procedure
- 2.9 Apply proper radiation protection
- 2.10 Locate anatomic structures and landmarks on radiographs
