SOC 250 INTRODUCTION TO SOCIAL WORK

Credit Hours: 3 Lec: 3

PREREQUISITE: None

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces social work as a profession. It examines the forces that have influenced the evolution of social welfare and the demand for social workers and their services. This course will analyze the impact of poverty on society, the people who live in poverty, and the effectiveness of social response to address and eliminate poverty.

1. COURSE GOAL

Consider social work as a career choice. This course will include a practicum and help students gain a solid foundation in theories relevant to social work.

2. OUTCOMES

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 2.1 define within a global perspective social welfare, social institutions, social services, and social work and identify the different populations that are served by these systems.
- 2.2 distinguish social welfare from other major social institutions and social work from other helping professions.
- 2.3 critically analyze the value base, ethical dilemmas, historical evolution, theoretical concepts, and philosophical and political underpinnings of social welfare and social work.
- 2.4 identify and describe the commitment of social work as a profession to the promotion of social and economic justice on a local, state, tribal, federal, and global/international level.
- 2.5 distinguish between public, for-profit and non-profit private, and tribal social welfare structures; and identify the economic, social, and political local, state, national, and global contexts of these structures.
- 2.6 identify theoretical frameworks and practice processes of generalist social work including: ecological systems, strengths perspectives, and planned change processes.
- 2.7 explore the impact of poverty on society (local, state, national, and global) and its members.
- 2.8 critically analyze the theoretical perspectives to explain poverty and the nature, structure, and effectiveness of services and programs developed to address poverty.
- 2.9 critically evaluate the social welfare response to and social work practice with populations differentiated by reasons of class, age, gender, gender identity, ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, geography, life style, and/or physical or mental conditions.
- 2.10 demonstrate understanding of the integration of research and professional social work practice with emphasis on empirically based research and practice.
- 2.11 demonstrate a beginning knowledge of the role of information technology in provision of social work services.
- 2.12 make an informed career decision by means of service learning experience in a human service agency as well as the experience of taking the course.

6. STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 6.1 Under AWC Policy, students are expected to attend every session of class in which they are enrolled.
