## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Industrial practices of the shielded metal arc welding process.

To develop manipulative skill in joining of plate by the SMAW process in all four basic positions, in a safe and efficient manner, utilizing the proper electrode, equipment adjustment and joint application.
